By all appearances, we felt things were looking up as the new normal began to settle in. Our programs were seeing a steady decline as it appeared more people were getting back on their feet. This changed in March 2022 when we started to see more cars lining up in our parking lot, and our drivers reported more people at the Mobile Food Pantry sites. At the same time, reports of the growing inflation started hitting the news.

Between March and June 2022, we saw an increase of individuals served through many of our programs. The largest increases were seen in our Emergency Food Boxes (32%) and our mobile programs (27% for Mobile Food Pantry & 29% for Farms to Families). We were finding that families were needing help longer, as nearly half of all households were coming in for an Emergency Food Box three times or more. These numbers all boil down to the reality that the past two years, first

with the pandemic followed by the nearly unbearable inflation, has taken food off many tables.

With the growing need, we undertook expanding our building to double our freezer storage capacity. The new freezer will relieve the stress we face every holiday season, and keep us from having to utilize off site storage when our original freezer is stuffed with turkeys. Additionally, our new mobile program Farms to Families had its first full year of service. This program proved vital in the summer to help meet the growing need.

One of the strongest constants we had through the ups and downs of this past year was our community. You continued to go above and beyond to help us. Food donors of all sizes gave all they could, countless financial donors gave additional gifts, and volunteers picked up even more shifts. It was a true testament that it takes a village.

Weld Food Bank Programs



Kids Cafe

An after-school program where we provide nutritional, prepared meals and snacks for undernourished children. **Last school year we served 53,484 meals to children.**



Backpack Program

Provides food for children who are at risk for hunger over the weekend. **This past** year, with the help of our agency partners, we distributed 63,371 backpacks.



Summer Feeding

Makes hot lunches accessible to children over the summer months when free and reduced school meals are not available. **Last summer, we served 61,148 meals to kids.**



School Food Pantries

In select schools throughout Weld County, so teachers have access to food during times when students come to school hungry. Last year, the School Food Pantries were accessed over 500 times.



Emergency Food Boxes

A box of basic food staples available to any resident of Weld County who needs help during a difficult time. Last year, we distributed 36,020 Emergency Food Boxes.



Mobile Food Pantry

A refrigerated beverage truck used to deliver fresh produce, dairy products, meat, bakery, and dry goods directly to hungry people in high-need areas. **Our Mobile Food Pantry distributed 2 million pounds of food to 73,000 (duplicated) individuals last year.**



Senior Feeding Program

For seniors over 60 years of age, this program ensures that seniors get the basic nutrition necessary for good health. Last year, we distributed 27,527 nutritional food packages to seniors.



Farms to Families

Through a custom-built truck, this program brings healthy perishable foods to smaller sites such as low-income senior living centers, our Child Feeding sites, and select nonprofit partner agencies. **Through Farms to Families, we served 8,496 individuals, including 3,775 children.**



Nonprofit Agency Partners

We work closely with various other nonprofit agency partners throughout Weld County. Last year, the food bank worked with 75 different nonprofit agencies, saving them \$2.4 million in food costs.
